What is the level of your Salvation?

Have you ever wondered what *salvation* is? Of course, all those who go to church every Sunday have heard not only salvation, but also terms like *sacrifice*, *God* and *faith* from the preacher, which are considered as the means to attain *salvation*. What the Church preachers have taught us that salvation is deliverance of the soul from sin and its consequences and is the ultimate goal of Christianity as well as all other religions, and the only way to achieve it is through faith; but what is faith then?

As far as we know, faith is a virtual, abstract concept, something that only exists as a state of mind and sometimes we are not even aware if it exists at all, let alone want to see it, smell it and touch it or even measure it! Yes, you heard right, salvation can be measured, not in the context of pseudoscience, but through the standards of the pure science, with the accuracy we only find in mathematics and physics. If you stay with me until the end of this article, you will find that not only salvation is a real tangible issue, but also it can be measured and valued.

Prof Amir Naseri in his full detailed book <u>All-and-None</u>, which is occasionally called the *Theory of Consciousness*, by explaining the mechanism of universe and existence in a peripheral view, has managed to prove that what most religions have been sought to reveal to us about life and its ultimate purpose, is like a massive floating iceberg that only one-tenth of it is visible to us. He describes religions not just as some ideological belief systems, rather, as critical and measurable scientific discourses that as you peruse this book, you will encounter a completely new phenomenon.

Naseri explains that some mystical systems of thought, especially Eastern religions, had instinctively understood some aspects of it, however, none had been able to draw a plausible diagram in order to explain their coordinates with mathematical equations. In a nutshell, salvation is a state of mind, so it is just a thought then it can basically be nothing more than just brain waves, so it has no material characteristic, and at best it's some frequencies that can be measured by devices like MRI and again, it equals to nothing. But worldly blessings are tangible, perceptible, they are real and that is everything! How is this possible?

Seriously, what is supposed to be saved: my worldly body or my spiritual *self*? Is Naseri going to talk over metaphysics? Not at all. As we peruse his theory to the end, we see that metaphysics is also a small part of the same misinterpretation of the origins of the universe. The point is here: Naseri explains how the whole universe has come such a long way from *nothing* to *everything* in order to reach the emergence. It's said and heard again and again that man is made up of energy, but where does the energy come from? From consciousness! But consciousness is also a mental state that is neither tangible nor has a material aspect, then it becomes *nothing* again!

So far, everything we have traced back to the roots has come to *nothing*. There are also mathematical formulas that prove these equations - the accuracy of these equations has been

confirmed by impartial scientists. Up to here, we have absolutely no theoretical assumptions, and it's also too early to be convinced that if salvation can ever come by a material basis at all? Even philosophy holds on its validity here, and this is exactly where the concept of <u>All'n'None</u> comes into play: *everything* out of *nothing*!

Independent physicists confirm that each component of matter divides into smaller components and again those smaller components subdivide into much smaller components and at the end of this process the very last component that remains is just vibration. This is what Eastern philosophers have already experienced, but here we are dealing with something beyond philosophy. Of course, philosophy has not been violated in any way, however it's been proved that whatever the philosophers propose is not in fact pure mentality. Here, philosophy is like a three-dimensional object full of details that can be explored and viewed from different angles, and incidentally, new angles show its true nature in a way that are even perceptible by touch. From every angle, scientific evidence reminds us that we are not facing a mental fantasy, that this is the reality of our universe we live in.

<u>All'n'None</u> is where the creation began: is it other than those cosmic physicists consider as the Big Bang to be the cause of the creation of universe? Once again, <u>All'n'None</u> explains that how this creation started from *nothing*. But what makes this "*absolute nothing*" to become "*entire everything*"? Consciousness!

The earliest forms of life date back to billions of years ago, and consciousness has promoted and expanded the species. Just like our "self", which we know has a completely different identity from who we are as worldly bodies. Psychologists confirm that it is the "self" of man who is conscious, not his material body. This is where religions fail to answer and inevitably interpret the "self" as soul, while this interpretation doesn't reflect all its aspects. Although, All'n'None never rejects the credibility of soul, yet it offers a more logical and scientific description that is even more comprehensible though.

Scientists consider evolution to be a factor of heredity and adaptation to the environment, which is quite true, but it is not the whole story. All'n'None explains that the evolution of all phenomena is towards *salvation*, and from here on the concept of *salvation* gradually becomes much clear now. Then can we say *salvation* is the same as *evolution*? Both yes and no: yes, because religions have tried to tell us the truth of mankind. No, because the description they provide is neither measurable nor valuable.

If we look at the bigger picture and notice the functions of the universe in different areas as "system", our perspective may shift and become wider, but how is this system defined and where does it originate? The same answer as before: **consciousness**! It is the **consciousness** that controls everything under **complexity** and reflects the concept of the system.

Now back to the first question: what is *salvation*, how is it achieved, and how can it be measured? Now it's the time for religious texts to enter into our discussion - which until now has been entirely scientific - to be analyzed. Surprisingly, the descriptions of *salvation* and *faith* overlap with the concepts of *symmetry* and *consciousness* that we have already proven to exist by scientific standards. Naseri likens the truth to an elephant in a dark room where people can be

aware of it only by touch, and everyone gets a different perception depending on where they touch. He considers the origin of all human conflicts from the beginning of time to the present to be these different perceptions of a single truth.

The hierarchy that exists in Kabbalah mysticism (occult knowledge in Jewish tradition) and Islamic mysticism can also be found in the physics of the universe, and sometimes with such similarities that it is hard to believe that there has been a several thousand years gap between them; besides, the other way around, the most fundamental scientific concepts are coincided in religious scriptures with the same precision that we know only in science itself. Symmetry is the most fundamental principle of physics on which the whole universe is based upon. We also see in religious texts that even the verses reflect *symmetry* not only in meaning but also in the arrangement of letters. When we arrive at the discussion of faith with the knowledge of mathematics, physics, neuroscience and many other scientific disciplines, we see that God (Deity) is no longer an imaginary being, faith is no longer an abstract concept, and most importantly *consciousness* is a completely tangible and impersonal element since its function can be touch, smell, and taste. If *faith* (belief) cannot be found in a permanent established *symmetry*, it won't lead to salvation, no matter how diligent you are in performing your religious duties. It doesn't matter if you are a Jew, a Muslim, a Buddhist, or a follower of any other belief system, faith is a scientific constant that is common to all, and the criterion for measuring it is your satisfaction with others, and the others' satisfaction with you in an equation, so the result is salvation. Here, by witnessing parts of different religious texts and comparing them with known scientific standards, Naseri emphasizes that faith and salvation are the same scientific constants that we use in mathematics and physics and can be applied and measured within the equations with the same accuracy.

So, now we know that the rate of *salvation* can be measured and calculated with mathematical accuracy. Even the concept of God gets more profound: God is no longer the imaginary being that no religion could ever fully convey. For many millennia mankind has sought after God in the heavens, Now Naseri has shown it to us in the last place we did not even think about, right inside your brain! So man has always had his God with him and has always watched his deeds, but not from the heavens rather from within himself. This description is consistent with even the oldest religious texts, so it's not something new: only this time the elephant is placed in a room that is no longer dark.

This is where science and religion come together: If we ignore the stereotypes that have been imposed on religion through centuries, *faith* and *salvation* are the essence of all religions and are common to all. *Consciousness* - as interpreted as *system* in scientific discourses - also plays an essential role in religions. So now the common denominator of science and religion is nothing but *consciousness*.

Existence is the result of aggregation that is possible only through symmetry, and the more symmetric elements there are in a system, the more "existence" is involved in that set. The evolution of existence can be observed and measured from "nothing" to "everything". Existence is made up of smaller parts that have taken different names in different belief systems, sometimes it is called self, soul or system, but whatever it is called, they are synonymous to consciousness. This structure requires a systematic connection between all the units of existence,

which leads to a dynamic movement from the lower level of existence towards higher levels. This structure is expressed in almost all systems of thought, but more importantly, today we can explain it in the language of science. This movement shows itself to us as *Emergence Theory*.

These astonishing scientific observations and their adaptation to the Abrahamic religions lead us to believe that there are indeed truths within the function of religions that had never seen before. Unfortunately, these facts are hidden from the eyes of scientists in various fields. Perhaps it is because religious truths lie at the heart of religious perversions, and the incompatibility of many religious teachings with modern science has reduced their position to a mere belief and shifted away from a scientific point of view.

<u>All'n'None</u> is like a table based on three legs: *Science*, *Theology* and *Philosophy*. Many concepts, especially religious ones that were considered old-fashioned and no one took them seriously, have found new identities with these serious meanings and cannot simply be rejected as before. At the same time, these concepts are much easier to explain than before, and this in itself has led to a deeper understanding of them.

<u>All'n'None</u> 's description of God, unlike previous descriptions that were purely virtual and abstract and could not even theoretically have a tangible material context, is now perfectly understandable, provable, and acceptable.

In fact, <u>All'n'None</u> is a spiritual movement based on science and inspired by the wisdom and philosophy of ancient ideas. <u>All'n'None</u> draws clear boundaries between *thought*, *faith*, *cognition* and *consciousness*, and their effects within the human mind, and covers many of the world's most influential thought systems. Unlike many belief systems, the <u>All'n'None</u> philosophy doesn't negate any of its predecessors, on the contrary, it seeks to create a unity between all ideas, from religious and mystical to metaphysical, law of attraction, esotericism, and even energy therapy, and to explain the legitimacy of all of them by allegorizing the "elephant in the dark room".

All'n'None suggests that *consciousness* is synonymous with God and covers all the descriptions from all religions and belief systems that God exist everywhere and can be expressed in a way that is tangible, as well as measurable and provable. *Consciousness* is a set of real things, the real *self* of the divine man. According to All'n'None, *consciousness* is the divine thought of the force of good and evil. The disease originates in the mind, and "consciousness" has a healing effect. All'n'None doctrine in general unites all human beliefs as *All'n'None in Unity*.

All-and-None is a spiritual and philosophical movement based on religious and metaphysical concepts, along with the ideas of mental science and its description of God is infinite intelligence, "supreme, universal, and eternal" and divinity dwells within every individual, that all people are spiritual beings, so everyone can be their own god. All'n'None believes the basis of *faith* in salvation and salvation is based on having satisfaction and being satisfied at the same time and is capable to calculate and prove this with the language of science signified that one's thoughts could unlock secrets of existence, free from the constraints of religious doctrines or dogmas.

Naseri uses the term *All'n'None* as a synonym for *Theory of Consciousness*, in which many sects with different roots, such as Idealism, Hinduism, etc. see eye to eye. Through <u>All-and-None</u>, man's mental state moves forward to become his experience in everyday life in order to achieve a better understanding of divine mysteries, through the power of their thoughts.

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
